



How I Got Started

- Patient of ex-wife gave bunch of trophies
- Realized parts were interchangeable
 - (mostly)
- Took apart and rebuilt
- Only thing needed were plaques



How I Got Started

- Parents most likely will not recognize that they are "used"
- Little Jill or Johnny Scout will not care



Get Used / Unwanted Trophies for Cheap!

• Where to Get

- Goodwill / Salvation Army
- Garage sales
- eBay
- FB Marketplace
- Etc.



Rebuild for Your Needs



Disassemble and use parts to build your own

- Sometimes you can reuse entire trophy except for trophy topper
 - Purchasing trophy topper lot cheaper than purchasing entire trophy!





Anatomy of Trophy

Topper

- Commonly used on very top of trophy
- More than 1,000 figures available
 e.g., good for derbies!





Column(s)

- Round or rectangular
- Used to give trophy exciting color
- Add height to award





Check Ring (round columns)

- Helps center column during assembly
 - Eliminates guess work
- Keeps parts from sliding around





Risers

Optional

Sometimes used under column

- Lift column
- Add height to award
- Gives unique touch





Base

- Bottom of trophy
- Usually marble, plastic, or wood
- Can be most costly part of trophy
 - Focus on finding these when going to Goodwill store, etc.







- Word of Caution!
- Not all bases are created equal!
 - Many different sizes and shapes
 - Some have off-setting holes
 - Some have holes spaced differently



Trophy Rods

- Threaded rods
- Connect trophy together
- Available in many lengths

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Coupler

- Used to join topper to threaded rod
- Can be used to connect several rods together
 - e.g., to achieve longer length






Hex Nut

- Connect parts together
- Standard size
 - 1/4"



• Buy in bulk

• Any hardware store or home center



Trophy Trim

- Works just like topper but typically much smaller
 - e.g., eagles, "1st" place, year, etc.
- Often used as side trim
- Larger double-column trophies
 - Will usually have 2 upper-trim above each column
 - Maybe lower trim between two columns







Anatomy of Trophy

- Summary
 - Topper
 - Column
 - Check Rings
 - Riser
 - Base
 - Rod, Coupler, Nut

Extra Parts that you do not need

- e.g., toppers for baseball, karate, bowling, etc.
 - Give to organization that can use them

Make trophies that are impressive!

Which is more impressive?







Make trophies that are impressive!

Column(s)

- Cheapest part of trophy
- Suggest using columns
 9" or greater

Multi-tier trophies

- Possibly make for major winners
- Make 1st place different from 10th place



Make trophies that are impressive!

Which is more impressive?





"More" is not always "Best!"

- Do not get too out of hand
- 4' trophies (or taller)?
 - How do kids display?
- Again, make 1st place different from 10th place



- Very easy!
- 7/16" nut driver or socket wrench
 - Usually only tool required
 - Nothing special you may already have one!
- Saw
 - May be needed to cut columns to length



- Get good idea what you want outcome to be
 - Your "vision"

• Parts

- Gather everything you need
- Lay out beforehand
- Measure for trophy rod(s)
 - May need to experiment with trial and error



• Procedure

- Start from top and work down
- May be helpful...
 - Turn everything upside down and / or lay on side

• Trophy rod

- When connecting to coupler(s), tighten 5-6 turns
- Allows room to loosen / tighten as needed later on
- Do not overtighten nut on bottom
 - (at this point)




• Finalize

- Stand trophy up
- Straighten out column, topper, etc.
- Ensure rod is not below the bottom of base
 - Do not want to scratch whatever trophy sits on!
- Tighten nut on bottom
- Lightly spray with Windex for nice shine



• Finalize

• Put felt on bottom to prevent scratching surface
