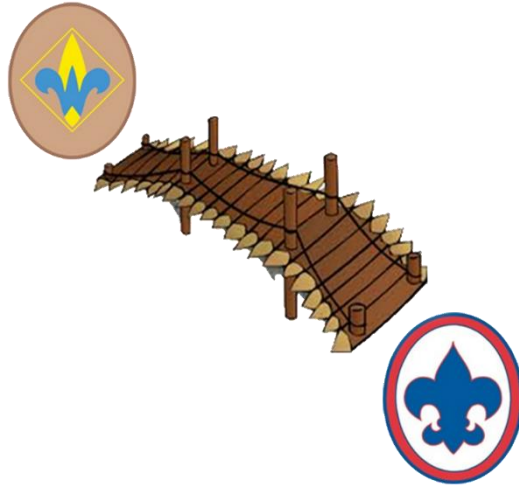


# How to Make a Crossover Bridge





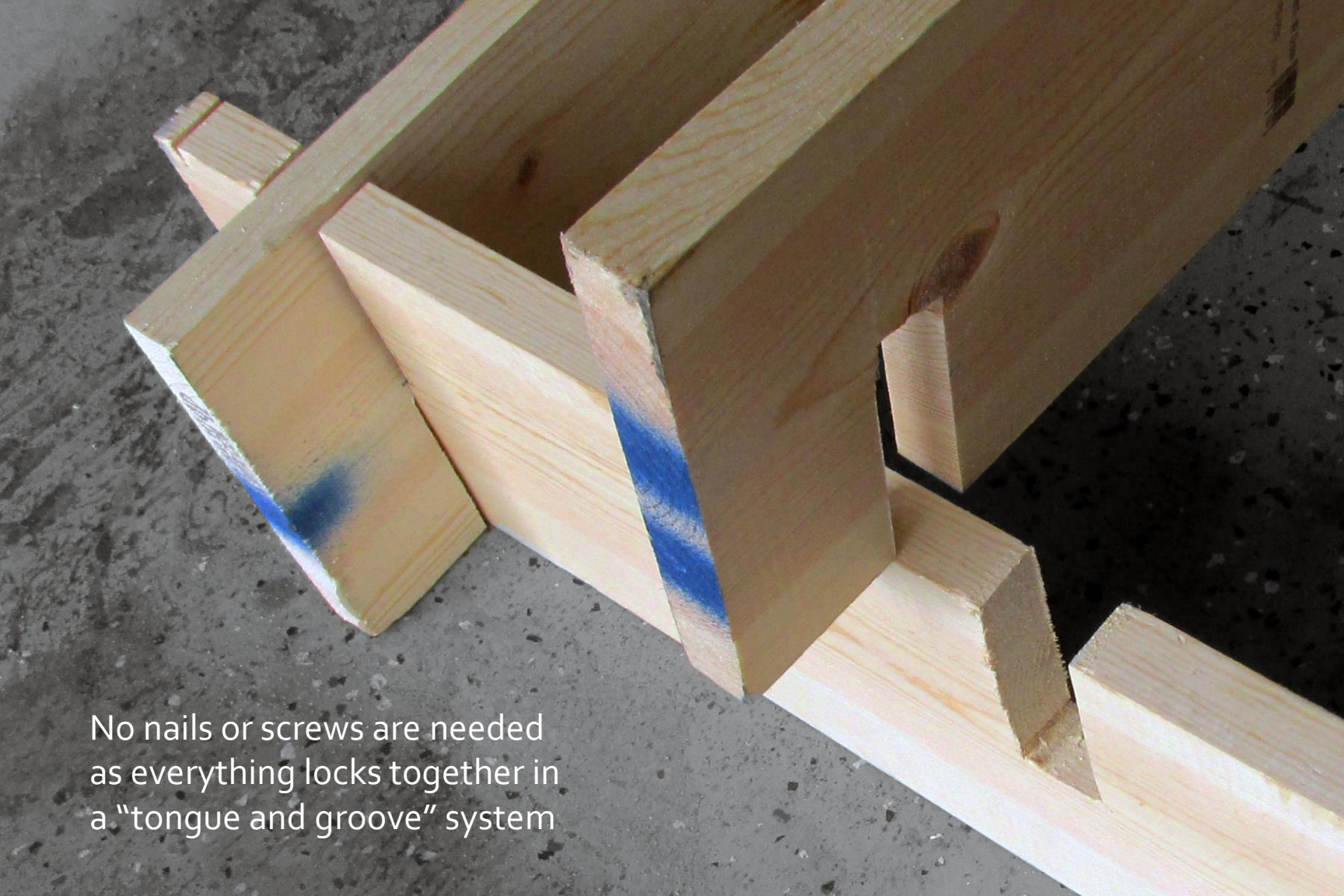
Everything can be purchased  
at your local home center

O SELF

All of the cuts are straight  
cuts...no miters or angles

ERS

UNTRY



No nails or screws are needed  
as everything locks together in  
a "tongue and groove" system

Each "long" plank represents  
part of the Scout Oath



Each of the “short” pieces is a point of the Scout Law  
(Note that filler pieces may be needed, depending on the size of your bridge)

Having each “graduating Webelos” Scout place each individual plank is an excellent way to involve the Scouts in the ceremony

The “planks” of the bridge break down nicely for easy storage  
(Note the grooves that were dadoed out of the bottom of each plank so they sit nicely on the long planks)
